## Aims

This module aims to examine modern ways of conducting international relations and the process by which international and regional organizations such as the United Nations, ASEAN and the EU came into being. The module focuses on diplomatic developments in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries including the following: the emergence of state sovereignty; the League of Nations and its failure; the collapse of empire and decolonization; the founding of the United Nations and development of the IMF, World Bank and WTO; the end of the Cold War and rise of the 'new world order'.
