Aims

This module aims to investigate the use of forensic linguistics in the modern world, focusing on two basic areas: the use of speech analysis software to help identify a speaker; and the use of text-based analysis to identify the writer of a text. In addition to considering the theory and practice behind these two areas, the module will discuss the use of language in the courtroom, and it will describe various high-profile cases where forensic linguistics has contributed to police investigations. Finally, there will be a consideration of tracing plagiarism.
