Aims

This module is designed to enable students to investigate the way language and other semiotic resources are used to communicate, legitimate and reproduce social identities and relations in a variety of contexts. As such, this module falls broadly within the interdisciplinary field of Critical Discourse Studies (CDS), an approach to discourse and discourse analysis which focuses on the way social issues are constructed through text and talk. In this module, the focus is on media discourse as the media have become the most pervasive platform in which notions of ideology, social and power relations are manifested in contemporary society. Media texts are also the most scrutinised genre in the field of Critical Discourse Studies.
