Aims

To provide students with an overview of the dynamic connections between literature and technological advancements in the 20th century. Various communication (e.g. telephone, telegraph), transport (e.g. railway, automobiles, airplanes), media (e.g. gramophone, print, cinema), and digital (e.g. cyberspace, hypertext) technologies will be studied from a literary-historical perspective to understand their widereaching effects on society and culture. Supplemented with an introduction to theories of posthumanism and technoculture, students will reflect on the impact of these technologies on the writing and production of literature as well as the influence of literature on new technologies and perceptions towards them. Texts examined will include literary, visual, and digital varieties.

- Outline of the history of various 20th-century communication, transport, media, and digital technologies.
- Literary representations of new technologies and experiences in a rapidly technologizing world.
- Technological innovations in print culture, literary production and consumption.
- Rise of mass literature, e.g. 'pulp' fiction, serial fiction, short stories, scientific romances, science fiction.
- The relationship between literature and cinema.
- Emergence of digital/hypertexts.
- Introduction to posthumanism and technocultural studies.
