From Seville to Brunei: A Visiting Academic's Journey in Teaching, Film, and Global Collaboration

My name is Juan Pablo Mora Gutiérrez, and I am an Associate Professor (AP) at the University of Seville (US), Spain. This is my fourth time serving as a Visiting Academic at the Universiti Brunei Darussalam (UBD). My first visit lasted 28 days in 2012, the second one for a full month in 2019, and the third for three months in 2023. Throughout all my visits, I have grown significantly both personally and professionally. This time, I am fortunate to be able to stay for almost six months.



What I have enjoyed the most is the interaction with the talented students of the Beginner Spanish class I have had the privilege of teaching at the LC of UBD, as well as from the modules I have attended this semester. I have also learned a great deal from the students and faculty through the many events and showcases I have attended. I am impressed by UBD's commitment to the SDGs and to innovative teaching methodologies such as Challenge-Based Learning and Design Thinking.



I have facilitated Collaborative International Learning (COIL) activities involving students from UBD (both FASS and the LC), as well as students from my home university and from California. Two English Studies students from the module Intercultural Communication, Syaza and Elyza, produced a short film, *Tanjung Geranjang*, with the technical and creative assistance of two Spanish students, Alejandra and Nuria, from the Faculty of Fine Arts of the University of Seville. This film has been shortlisted for the 8th PRISM Short Film Festival at UBD.

On 19 November, I delivered a talk at the FASS Seminar Series on the RASDELE project, an international cooperation initiative between the University of Seville and the University of Tifariti of the Sahrawi refugee camps in Tindouf, Algeria. The discussion with the UBD students and faculty who attended was extremely enriching.

Before I fly back to Spain on 31 January 2026, I hope to finalise the signing of an MOU and mobility agreements between my home university and UBD, which I believe will benefit both UBD and US faculty and students.

FASS Honours Professor Dr Noor Azam Haji-Othman with Professorial Lecture



FASS hosted a professorial lecture by Professor Dr Noor Azam bin Orang Kaya Maha Bijaya (OKMB) Haji Othman.

Professor Dr Noor Azam, an established scholar in English language and linguistics, has made significant contributions to linguistic studies, media studies, and language education throughout his distinguished career.

30.04.2025, UBD – In his lecture titled “The Ecology of Language in Brunei: Diversity, Interplay and Equity,” Professor Dr Noor Azam presented a critical synthesis of his lifelong research into the multilingual landscape of Brunei through an ecological framework of language. From a sociolinguistic perspective, he argued that languages in Brunei coexist, compete, and adapt within cultural, educational, and political contexts. He further emphasised that multilingualism should be understood as a dynamic and evolving system, rather than as a problem to be solved. The lecture also highlighted his long-standing advocacy for ecological equity among languages in Brunei, acknowledging that each language holds important roles and instrumental value.

Professor Dr Noor Azam’s research primarily focuses on analysing language, education, and state policies, with an emphasis on sociolinguistic and socio-cultural patterns. He believes that Brunei remains a veritable laboratory for linguistic research that deserves greater recognition by local scholars.

Currently serving as Deputy Vice Chancellor, Professor Dr Noor Azam has held various leadership roles at UBD. His academic journey includes tenures as Director of the Language Centre, Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, and Dean of the Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah Institute of Education (SHBIE). From 2014 to 2017, he was Director of the Centre for Advanced Research (CARE), where interdisciplinary research and innovation thrived under his leadership. He later served as Director and Visiting Professor at the UBD-FPT Global Centre in Da Nang, Vietnam (2017–2018), further showcasing UBD’s global presence.

A deep passion for academia, a relentless pursuit of self-improvement, and enduring support from family and colleagues have been central to Professor Dr Noor Azam's promotion to full professor at UBD.



Beyond the university, he was appointed Acting Deputy Permanent Secretary (Policy and Corporate) at the Ministry of Education from 2023 to 2024.

Throughout his career, Professor Dr Noor Azam has received numerous accolades in recognition of his academic and administrative excellence. These include the UBD Teaching Excellence Award for the Arts and Humanities (2012), the *Pingat Indah Kerja Baik* (PIKB)/Meritorious Service Medal (2013), a Special Mention Award during the 28th Brunei National Teacher's Day (2018), and the *Pingat Kerja Lama* (PKL) in June 2022.

In his remarks during the lecture, Professor Dr Noor Azam expressed heartfelt gratitude to his family, mentors, colleagues, and friends for their unwavering support.

One of the earliest local academics recruited into UBD's Department of English Language and Linguistics, Professor Dr Noor Azam shared that his aspiration to become a scholar and contribute to the development of linguistics in Brunei has always been his driving force. He has since published numerous academic works that have been cited both locally and internationally.

His research, particularly on the sociolinguistic situation in Brunei, has gained recognition from scholars worldwide, including his doctoral thesis *Changes in the Linguistic Diversity in Brunei Darussalam* (2005). Through his work, he aims to provide an accurate local perspective for the global academic community.

The professorial lecture also formed part of UBD's 40th-anniversary celebrations, commemorating four decades of academic excellence, innovation, and community impact since the university's establishment in 1985.



UBD Confers Professorship to Professor Dr Ahsan Ullah



13.05.2025, UBD – Professor Dr Ahsan Ullah has been promoted to Professor at FASS, recognising his outstanding contributions to research, teaching, and community engagement. With a PhD in Asian & International Studies and extensive experience working with vulnerable populations, including refugees and migrant communities, Professor Ullah has established himself as a leading scholar in migration, development, and social protection studies.

Throughout his distinguished career, he has combined rigorous academic research with practical engagement, providing insights that inform both policy and practice in Southeast Asia and beyond. His work with international organisations, NGOs, and academic institutions has strengthened regional and global collaborations, while his teaching has inspired and mentored countless students at UBD.

In this interview, we explore Professor Dr Ullah’s journey to professorship, his reflections on research and teaching, and his vision for advancing migration and development studies in the region.

DISCOVER FASS: You’ve had an impressive path, from earning a PhD in Asian & International Studies to working with NGOs and universities around the world. What inspired you to focus on migration, development, and refugee studies, and how has your journey shaped your current research interests?

PROFESSOR ULLAH: Thank you. My academic trajectory into migration, development, and refugee studies was not predetermined; rather, it unfolded organically through field experiences and mentorship. I initially began my PhD at the National University of Singapore, intending to study internal migration, but I eventually discontinued the programme and later joined City University of Hong Kong, where I planned to work on NGOs and development in the global south. It was there that I met my supervisor, Professor Kevin Hewison, who fundamentally altered my scholarly trajectory. He gave me four day’s time to consider whether I wished to shift my research toward migration, an area he astutely anticipated would become globally consequential. That unexpected yet formative intervention, coupled with my earlier NGO work across various countries, exposed me to the lived realities of mobility, inequality, and precarity. Together, these experiences crystallized my commitment to examining how and why people move, the political economy underpinning such movements, and the ways states and institutions negotiate and regulate mobility.

DISCOVER FASS: Much of your work addresses migration, displacement, and social protection. Which of your research projects do you consider the most meaningful or transformative, and why?

PROFESSOR ULLAH: One of the most meaningful and transformative projects in my career remains my doctoral research, later published as *Rationalizing Migration Decisions* (Ashgate 2010; Routledge 2016). That project shifted my focus from broad development studies to the heart of migration scholarship. It rooted my interest in why people move, how they navigate vulnerability, and how their aspirations intersect with governance systems, questions that have shaped much of my subsequent work on labour migration, mobility regimes, and the migration–development nexus. A second major turning point was my research on forced displacement and statelessness, particularly on the Rohingya. This work, culminating in *The Untold Stories of the Rohingyas* (Bristol University Press, 2023) and *Refugee Politics in the Middle East and North Africa* (Palgrave, 2014), demanded deep ethnographic engagement and revealed how identity, exclusion, and geopolitics structure refugee lives. Projects on migrant health during COVID-19, on citizenship as a tool of inclusion and exclusion (Oxford University Press, 2025), and on social protection and remittances – opened new areas of inquiry into how global crises, power structures, and inequality shape mobility. What has been most transformative, however, is the larger journey: beginning in NGO development work, entering migration studies almost by accident, and gradually building an interdisciplinary research agenda at the intersection of migration, development, security, and human rights.

DISCOVER FASS: In your role at UBD, you teach modules like Migration Studies, international relations, Globalisation, and Welfare. How do you connect your real-world research experience with your teaching, and what do you hope students take away from those courses?

PROFESSOR ULLAH: My teaching is heavily dependent on my research, which spans South Asia, Southeast Asia, the Middle East and North Africa, Europe, and North America. In courses such as Migration Studies, International Relations, Globalisation, and Welfare, I draw directly on my fieldwork with Bangladeshi, Filipino, Nepali, Syrian, Afghan, and Rohingya communities, as well as my work on labour governance, forced displacement, vaccine diplomacy, and welfare regimes. These lived experiences allow me to illustrate how abstract theories, whether about migration systems, global power structures, or welfare models, take shape in everyday life. I routinely integrate interview narratives, ethnographic observations, and policy encounters into classroom discussions so students understand both the conceptual frameworks and the human realities behind them. What I hope students take away is the ability to connect theory to lived experience. Whether they are analysing labour migration, borders, global inequalities, or welfare reforms, I want them to see how academic concepts translate into real-world consequences for individuals, families, and communities. My aim is to inspire them to think critically, cultivate empathy, and recognise that rigorous scholarship can lead to meaningful impact, whether in government, NGOs, international organisations, or academia.

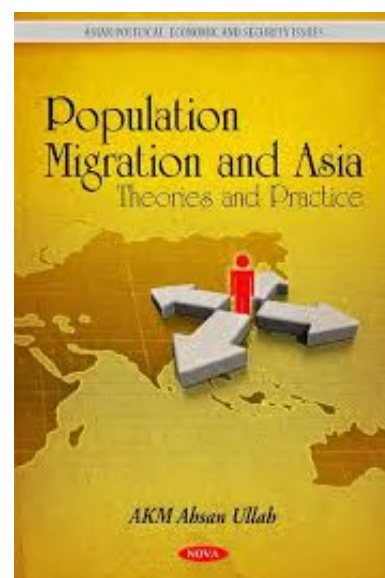
DISCOVER FASS: Your research covers vulnerable populations, such as refugees and migrants. What are some of the biggest ethical challenges you've faced in your work, and how do you navigate them?

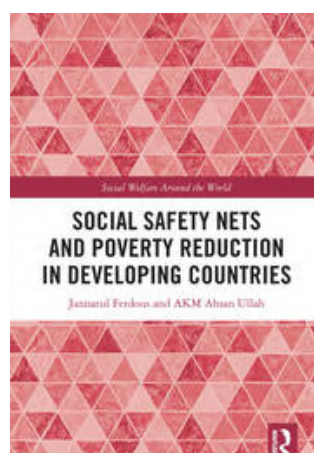
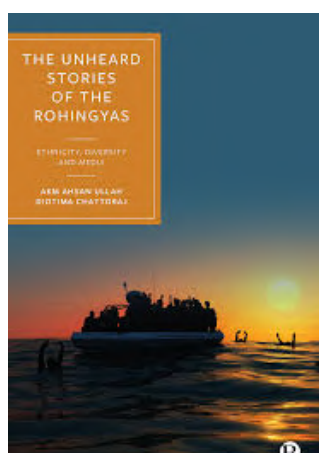
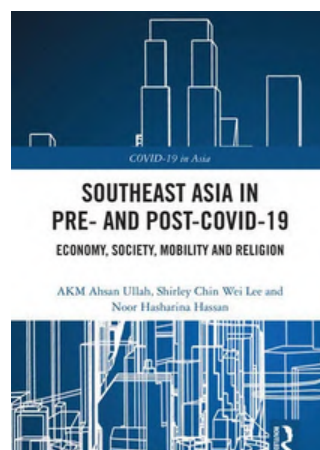
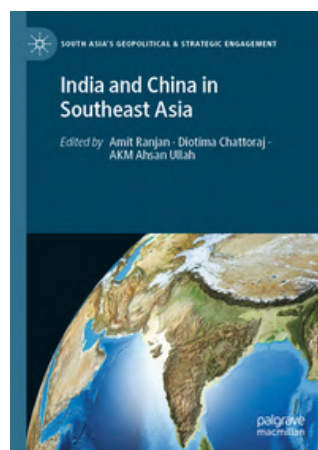
PROFESSOR ULLAH: One of the most persistent ethical challenges in my research with refugees and migrants is negotiating the tension between documenting structural injustice and safeguarding the dignity, safety, and emotional well-being of participants. Working in contexts such as Rohingya camps in Bangladesh, refugee settlements in the Middle East, and migrant labour sites in Southeast Asia, I routinely encounter individuals whose lives are shaped by trauma, legal precarity, and power asymmetries. Ensuring informed consent in environments of fear, managing expectations about what research can deliver, and avoiding the extraction of painful narratives for academic gain require constant reflexivity. I deal with these dilemmas by adopting an ethics-of-care approach – prioritising trust-building, transparency, and the minimisation of harm – alongside strict adherence to anonymity, data protection, and culturally sensitive engagement. Part of my reflections on these dilemmas is elaborated in my recent work (Ullah AKM Ahsan. 2025. “Ethical Imperatives in Migration Health: Justice and Care in Forced Migration Contexts” on *Developing World Bioethics*, 25(2), where I argue that ethical practice in migration research extends beyond procedural compliance to a broader commitment to justice, reciprocity, and the responsible representation of vulnerable lives.

DISCOVER FASS: You have collaborated with international institutions and provided consultancy to bodies like the World Bank. How do you see your academic work influencing real-world policy, especially in migration and development?

PROFESSOR ULLAH: My academic work has consistently intersected with policy debates in migration and development, allowing research to inform practice in tangible ways. Through collaborations with institutions such as the World Bank, IOM, UN agencies, and regional policy networks, I have contributed evidence-based analyses grounded in extensive fieldwork across South Asia, Southeast Asia, and the Middle East. These engagements have enabled me to translate empirical insights, on recruitment systems, migrant vulnerabilities, remittance behaviours, displacement dynamics, and welfare gaps, into policy recommendations that shape programme design and governance reforms. My research on ethical recruitment, for instance, has informed discourse on lowering migration costs and regulating intermediaries, while my work on forced displacement and statelessness has supported policy dialogues on protection frameworks and durable solutions. I see academic research as a crucial bridge between lived experience and institutional decision-making: rigorous, context-sensitive scholarship provides policymakers with grounded understanding, and in turn, policy partnerships ensure that academic knowledge contributes meaningfully to improving the lives of migrants and their families.

DISCOVER FASS: Looking ahead, what are your aspirations for migration and refugee studies, both at UBD and in the global research community? And who or what do you credit most for supporting and shaping your career to this point?

PROFESSOR ULLAH: I envision migration and refugee studies at UBD evolving into a regional hub for evidence-based research, South–South dialogue, and policy innovation. Brunei’s strategic position and multicultural landscape make it an ideal setting to study mobility, labour governance, and humanitarian challenges in Southeast Asia. I aim to deepen collaborations with organisations such as IOM, UNHCR, and ASEAN partners, while training a new generation of scholars capable of conducting rigorous fieldwork and contributing fresh insights on climate-induced mobility, migrant health, statelessness, and protection regimes. Globally, I hope the field advances toward more inclusive and decolonised knowledge production. My aspiration is for UBD to play a meaningful role in shaping this shift through scholarship that is empirically grounded, theoretically rigorous, ethically conscious, and globally relevant. The foundations of my career were shaped most profoundly by my parents, teachers, community builders, and war survivors, whose lives embodied integrity, resilience, and service. My father, who founded several educational institutions, and my mother, whose spirituality, struggles, and unwavering commitment to children’s learning shaped my earliest values, taught me what it means to live with purpose. Their prayers, sacrifices, and belief in education gave me the courage to pursue a life of inquiry across continents. I also owe much to mentors such as Professor Kevin Hewison, who redirected my academic path toward migration studies, and to the colleagues and students who continue to challenge and inspire my thinking.

Discover FASS congratulates Professor Dr Ahsan Ullah on his promotion to Professor at UBD. His passion for research, dedication to teaching, and commitment to uplifting communities have left a lasting impact on students and colleagues alike. We wish him continued inspiration, success, and joy as he embraces this new chapter, and we look forward to seeing his work continue to shape migration and development studies both in Brunei and across the region.

Professor Dr Fredolin Tangang Received Emeritus Honour



22.11.2025, UKM – Professor Dr Fredolin Tangang has recently been conferred the prestigious title of Emeritus Professor by Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM), in recognition of his outstanding contributions to climate science, research, and higher education in Southeast Asia. Holding a BSc from the University of Malaya, an MS from Iowa State University, and a PhD from the University of British Columbia, he has dedicated over three decades to advancing meteorology, climatology, and regional climate modelling.

Beyond his research achievements, Professor Dr Tangang is widely recognised as a mentor to generations of students and a leader in fostering collaboration across universities and research institutions. In this interview, he reflects on his career, shares insights from decades of climate research, and outlines his vision for the future of climate science.

At the international and regional levels, he has made significant contributions to climate change science, including serving as Working Group I Vice-Chair of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) during the Fifth Assessment Cycle (AR5). He also championed regional climate downscaling in Southeast Asia by helping to establish CORDEX Southeast Asia in 2013, providing leadership in advancing regional climate understanding until his retirement from UKM in 2023.

In this interview, we explore his reflections on his journey, his most memorable contributions, and the legacy he hopes to leave for future generations of scholars.

DISCOVER FASS: Congratulations on your conferment as Emeritus Professor at UKM. Looking back, what have been the most defining moments in your academic and research career?

PROFESSOR TANGANG: Thank you for this opportunity. My academic journey has been a long and meaningful one, beginning when I started as a Tutor at UKM Sabah Campus in 1986 and continuing until my compulsory retirement in March 2023. As an academic, teacher, and researcher, I have always found deep fulfilment in sharing knowledge with students and guiding them through their master's and PhD degrees. Continuing my work here at FASS UBD reflects my ongoing passion and personal commitment: as long as I am healthy and needed, I wish to keep contributing. These are the true sources of satisfaction in my career. Along the way, I have also been fortunate to receive various recognitions and awards. In 2021, two years before my retirement, I was honoured with Malaysia's 14th *Anugerah Akademik Negara* (AAN) for Best Scientific Publication. In 2011, I was inducted as a Fellow of the Academy of Sciences Malaysia (ASM) for my contributions to climate change and climate variability research, and for advancing knowledge both in Malaysia and throughout Southeast Asia.

DISCOVER FASS: Your work in climatology and regional climate modelling has been influential across Southeast Asia. Can you share which of your research projects you feel has had the most impact, and why?

PROFESSOR TANGANG: To tell the truth, I have been involved in many research projects throughout my academic career – both big and small – probably around 30 in total. I still remember my very first research project after returning from Canada, where I completed my PhD at the University of British Columbia (UBC) and developed a model to forecast the El Niño–Southern Oscillation (ENSO) phenomenon. When I returned to the UKM Main Campus in Bangi in July 1997, Peninsular Malaysia was experiencing the impacts of the strongest El Niño event ever recorded. We faced the worst and most prolonged haze episode at the time, and the public did not understand what was happening. I suddenly became an “academic celebrity,” as the print media and television began portraying me as the only person who could explain the effects of the El Niño phenomenon, thanks to my PhD research at UBC.

However, I must admit that at that time, I did not actually have much knowledge about the mechanisms through which El Niño affects Malaysia's and the region's climate, because my PhD work focused on the El Niño phenomenon itself, not on its regional impacts. This lack of understanding shaped my very first research project on examining the effects of El Niño in Malaysia and Southeast Asia. *Alhamdulillah*, through that project and several subsequent ones, we were able to advance the scientific understanding of El Niño teleconnection effects in Malaysia and across the Southeast Asian region. In the early 2000s, I shifted my attention more towards global warming and climate change. By 2013, we successfully established CORDEX Southeast Asia, which became a major pillar of regional climate modelling activities in the region, and I had the privilege of leading it until 2023.

DISCOVER FASS: Every researcher faces challenges along the way. Could you share a significant challenge you encountered in your work and how it shaped your approach to science and leadership?

PROFESSOR TANGANG: At a personal and institutional level, challenges and obstacles will always exist and can hinder your progress. At the institutional level, issues such as limited funding, competition, unhealthy political culture, and even backstabbing can arise and drag you down if you are not careful. However, if we are sincere in our work, do our best, avoid unnecessary conflict, and remain humble – choosing instead to work as team members – *InshaAllah*, the rewards will come. At the same time, courage is needed to step into the vacuum when leadership is lacking and to show the willingness to lead the way. I was fortunate enough to be nominated by the Malaysian Government for the position of IPCC Working Group I Vice-Chair, and I was elected. However, operating at the global level is an entirely different game; one must learn quickly, cover the ground fast, show confidence, and lead effectively. My engagement with the IPCC broadened my leadership skills, confidence, and professional network. This experience helped me in establishing CORDEX Southeast Asia when I realised that, despite the region's high climate vulnerability, there had been very limited regional climate downscaling and projection activities prior to 2013. I seized this gap, provided leadership, and built the initiative over more than a decade.

DISCOVER FASS: Climate science is evolving rapidly, especially in Southeast Asia. What do you see as the key priorities and opportunities for the next generation of climate scientists in the region?

PROFESSOR TANGANG: I have just finished writing my latest article for my column in Utusan Sarawak. I write in Malay, and I am grateful to have proficiency in *Bahasa Melayu*. If we want to educate the public on a complex issue like climate change, we must be able to communicate in a language that the masses can read and understand. The article is a reflection on the recent chaotic and extreme weather events in Malaysia, Southeast Asia, and South Asia that have killed hundreds of people and affected millions across the region. The article is titled “*Kecelaruhan cuaca di Malaysia, rantau Asia Tenggara dan Selatan Asia sejak pertengahan November 2025*”. Please feel free to read it to understand the gravity of the extreme weather and climate conditions that lie ahead for our region in the coming decades if the world fails to act collectively and urgently to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and limit warming to below 1.5°C, as stipulated in the Paris Agreement.

DISCOVER FASS: As you receive the Emeritus title, how do you reflect on your legacy, and what advice would you give to aspiring academics who hope to make a meaningful impact in their field?

PROFESSOR TANGANG: The Emeritus title is a pinnacle of academic life, but titles have never defined me. I remain the same person – humble, hardworking, and committed to serving through knowledge. I am grateful to begin a new chapter at UBD after retiring from UKM, even if it meant taking a lower position. Brunei feels close to home, both geographically – being near my hometown of Menumbok – and personally, especially when I can enjoy ambuyat again. To me, joining UBD is not just a job; it is a calling. It is an opportunity to build climate research and modelling capacity for Brunei, to bring global and regional expertise – including CORDEX Southeast Asia – into a national context, and to help prepare the country for the climate challenges of the future. This is a responsibility I take very seriously. But before we can address complex questions about future risks and adaptation, we must strengthen the scientific foundation – the physical understanding of climate change in Brunei. From the moment I arrived at UBD, I worked towards building this capacity, despite not knowing the research landscape or anyone here. With perseverance and teamwork, we formed the UBD Climate Change Modelling Group, uniting colleagues from FOS, SDS, and FIT. Within a year, we completed a major national proposal that will allow Brunei to produce 1 km – resolution climate projections, extreme sea level simulations, and nationwide flood maps – data that will be vital for decades to come. This proposal also sets the foundation for an integrated Climate Change Data Centre at UBD. But this is just the beginning. We must push forward with the Climate Change Adaptation Research Cluster and undertake multidisciplinary research that truly helps Brunei navigate the risks ahead. I sincerely hope colleagues in FASS will walk together on this important journey.

SEAMJ is a peer-reviewed and open-access journal covering the spectrum of languages and cultures of contemporary Southeast Asian societies with high-quality theoretical, analytical, and empirical works, including language, culture and society in the Malay world, youth culture and social media, digital development, sustainable urbanisation in Southeast Asia, globalisation and security, and migration. SEAMJ also publishes articles in both Malay and English. Since 2010, it has transitioned to online publishing.

The ceremony aimed to showcase SEAMJ's history and publications since its inception in 1999, and celebrate its milestones, including its first special issue, Teaching English in Southeast Asia, in 2002/2003, its growth from an annual publication under FASS to a triannual journal with Emerald Publishing in 2022.



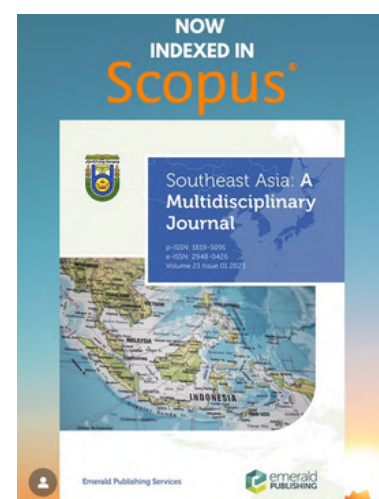

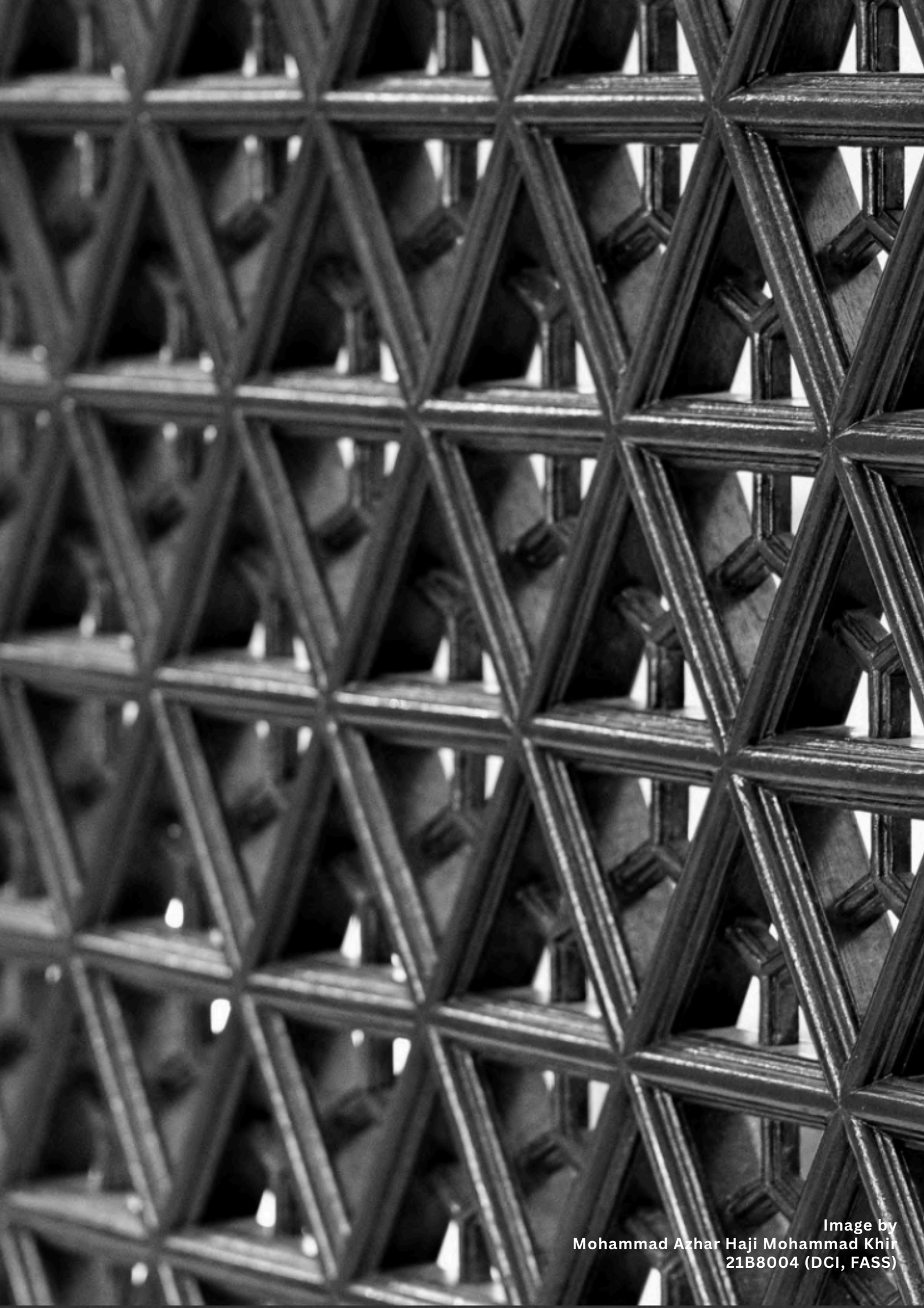

From March 1 to 31, 2025, Dr. Maria Carinnes Alejandria served as a Residential Fellow at the Loughborough University Institute of Advanced Studies (IAS), based at the university's scenic Loughborough campus. During her fellowship, Dr Alejandria delivered two lectures drawing from her ongoing research project on flood preparedness among urban communities in Southeast Asia, particularly within the BIMP-EAGA subregion (Brunei, Indonesia, Malaysia, and the Philippines).

Through the generous sponsorship of the IAS and the intellectually stimulating events it organized, Dr Alejandria engaged with a dynamic network of scholars working on sustainability, resilience, and humanitarian studies. "The fellowship provided me the space to pause, reflect, and reimagine the trajectory of my work," she shared, expressing her deep gratitude to Professor Ksenia Chmutina for the invitation and mentorship. She looks forward to bringing these new insights back to Brunei and sharing them with her collaborators from Indonesia, Malaysia, and the Philippines, as they continue to advance emerging epistemologies in disaster and resilience research.

Officiated by the Dean of FASS, the launch reflects the Programme's ongoing commitment to nurturing scholarly engagement with local culture and strengthening the study of Bruneian literature and heritage.



FASS and UK academics hold workshop on embedding equity, diversity and inclusion in Brunei higher education

25.08.2025, UBD – FASS, UBD in collaboration with two academics at the University of the Built Environment, UK, held a workshop on Embedding Equity, Diversity & Inclusion (EDI) in Higher Education in Brunei. The workshop was led by Dr Muhammad Qasim Rana from the University of the Built Environment in the UK and Dr Sharifah Nurul Huda Alkaff from FASS, UBD. Two other academics, Professor Angela Lee from the UK and Ms Khairunnisa Haji Ibrahim from UBD, are also part of the project team. The EDI-Brunei project is funded by the British Council and managed by SEAMEO RIHED in Bangkok.



The half-day workshop took place at the Main Library of UBD. It featured three presentations. Dr Rana presented a paper on the significance of EDI for Brunei's higher education, while Dr Sharifah presented preliminary findings from the Brunei higher education institutional gender mapping of faculty and students across the three Bruneian universities: UBD, Universiti Teknologi Brunei (UTB) and Universiti Sultan Sharif Ali (UNISSA). Ms Khairunnisa meanwhile presented initial findings from a project on gendered patterns of publications in UBD.

More than 30 participants ranging from graduate students to academics and officials from the Ministry of Education took part in the workshop. They engaged in group discussions about the barriers to EDI and potential solutions, with each group presenting their findings at the conclusion of the workshop.



The Brunei project team was invited to take part in the SEA-UK GEDI Leadership Forum on 29 - 31 October 2025, in London, the United Kingdom. The team was represented by Ms. Khairunnisa, who joined fellow project leads from Southeast Asia and other partners who are involved in Phase II of the Strengthening Leadership with Gender Equity, Diversity and Inclusivity in Higher Education Institutions in South East Asia project, including UK partner universities, SEA Ministries and UK government bodies.

Ms Khairunnisa presented findings from the EDI-Brunei workshop, as well as the findings of the gender-disaggregated data from the institutional mapping of UBD, UTB, UNISSA, and joined other forum participants in a roundtable discussion, campus visits and stakeholder forum. A full report on the EDI-Brunei project was also presented at the forum.

Researching Ageing Futures: Driving Policy, Possibility, and Purpose in Brunei

17-19.09.2025, Beijing – Dr Siti Mazidah Hj Mohammad, Director for the Centre for Advanced Research (CARE) and Assistant Professor, FASS was invited to speak at the APEC Seminar - Digital Solutions and Technologies for Senior Citizens' Connectivity and Healthiness.

A productive and fulfilling week where academics, policymakers, NGOs, practitioners and experts from various APEC economies were brought together to share and discuss their initiatives, experiences, challenges faced and way forward in developing healthy ageing.



Some of the key concepts that stood out throughout the events were digital literacy, digital inclusion, dignity, spirituality domain, cultural context, gendered ageing and people-centred approach in ageing approaches and solutions.

One of the key highlights of the event was the field trip to the Future Laboratory at Tsinghua University, China Unicorn, and the Robot Mall.

A Literary Journey Through Brunei's Novels

8.05.2025, Gadong – Dr Kathrina Mohd Daud from the English Studies Programme delivered a guest lecture titled "From the 'Bloody Crown' to Ecological Saviour: A Brief History of the Novel in Brunei Darussalam" to more than 40 literature-enthusiast students at Duli Pengiran Muda Al-Muhtadee Billah College.

The lecture traced the evolution of Bruneian fiction, highlighting shifts from early narratives centred on power and conflict to contemporary works engaging with ecological and social concerns.

10-12.10.2025, China – Dr Hannah M. Y. Ho participated in the 10th China–South Asia and Southeast Asia Think Tank Forum held in Kunming.

An afternoon performance, *Penunggu Gaung Nibung*, further captivated audiences through its creative adaptation of Dusun folklore.



The two-day programme attracted more than 600 participants from 12 primary and secondary schools across Brunei. Highlights included student-led creative exhibitions from the AS-2301 and AS-1206 modules, as well as the launch of *Mengenal AI*, a booklet produced under the AS-1306 *Sastera dan Industri Kreatif* module and supervised by Dr Ena Herni Wasli.

The festival also welcomed *Komunitas Taman Bacaan Indonesia*, whose participation included a stage performance and a short story writing workshop facilitated by young Bruneian writer, Ms Liyana binti Awg Haji Julay. Now in its 11th edition, the *Festival Sastera* continues to provide a vibrant platform for young learners, educators, and the wider community, fostering appreciation of Bruneian literature while bridging literature, education, and the creative industries.



Driving Impact Through Innovation: FASS Participates the International Higher Education Summit & Exhibition 2025



11-12.11.2025, UBD – FASS took part at the Entrepreneurship, Innovation & Commercialisation showcase at the International Higher Education Summit & Exhibition 2025 (IHEEIC2025), where the Sociology & Anthropology Programme together with the Malay Language, Linguistics & Literature Programme presenting two cutting-edge research initiatives led by our dedicated academics.

“KitaAlert: Urban Flood Resilience Toolkit for BIMP-EAGA,” spearheaded by Dr Maria Carinnes Alejandria and her team, introduces an innovative community-driven platform that strengthens climate resilience through real-time reporting, participatory mapping, and integrated disaster management across the region.

Complementing this, “Being Malay in Non-Malay Land,” led by Dr Lalu Nurul Yaqin, provides fresh empirical insights into identity, cultural continuity, and the lived experiences of Malay communities outside their homeland, illustrating the value of linguistic and ethnographic scholarship in understanding multicultural dynamics. The event reaffirmed the faculty’s commitment to advancing knowledge, inspiring innovation, and contributing to a stronger, more connected region.

Bridging Literary Worlds: A Regional Learning Journey

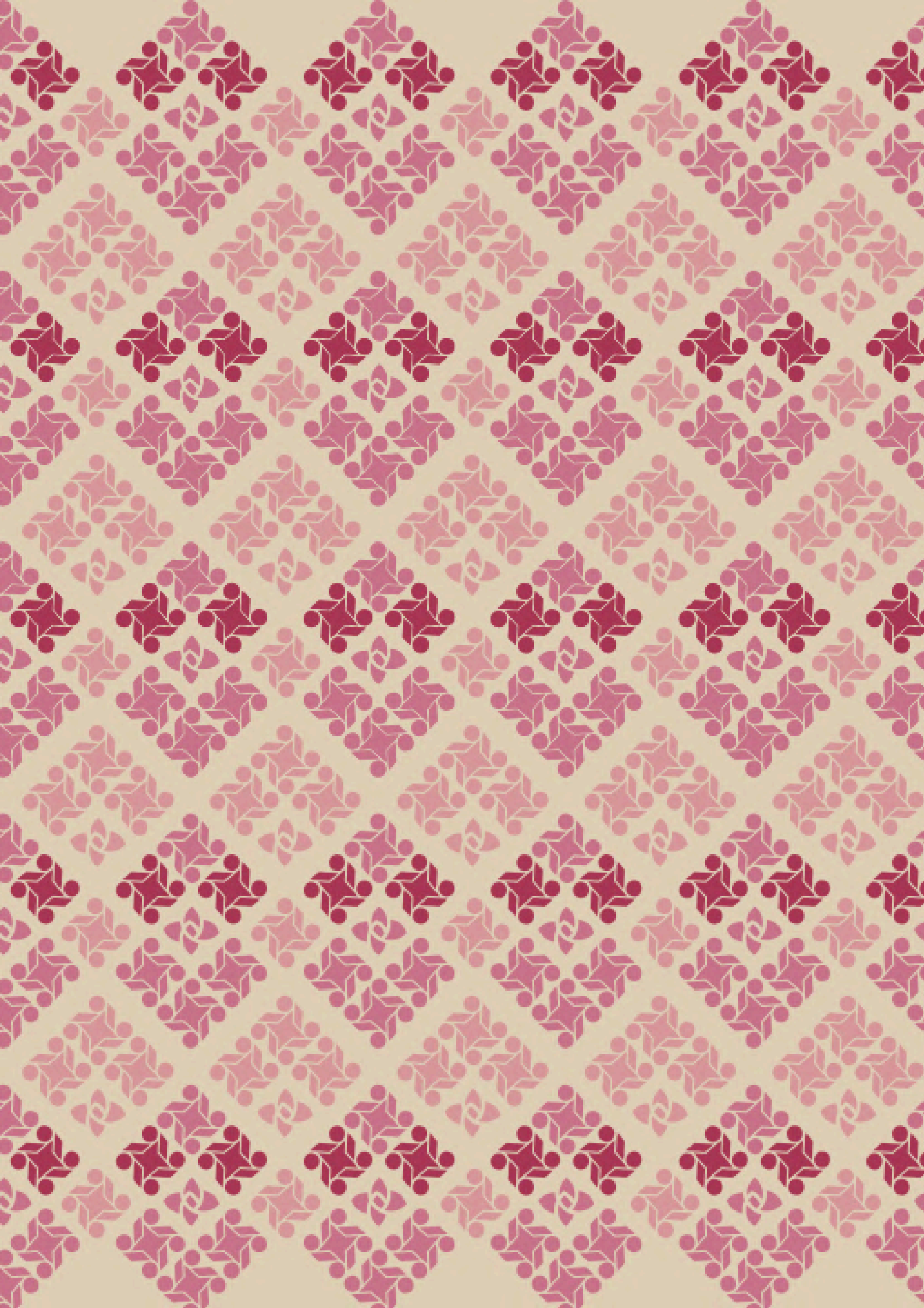

Threads of Creativity: The Story Behind UBD's 40th Anniversary Garment Design

In this special edition, we shine a spotlight on the creative brilliance emerging from our FASS's Design & Creative programme: Mr Mohammad Nurhanafi Abdul Azim Bin Hj Mohd Saiful Bakhtiar (22b0039) and Ms Kotchawan Chueathong (22b8040).

This year's 40th UBD anniversary garment design selection has revealed the remarkable talent, imagination, and technical skill of our young designers, each bringing forward a unique blend of innovation and cultural expression. Among the standout works is a striking creation by two students whose dedication and artistry captured the attention of the selection panel.

In the following conversation, we sit down with these promising designers to learn more about the journey behind their work, from the sparks of inspiration that shaped their concepts, to the challenges they navigated during the design process. They share candid reflections on collaboration, mentorship, and the emotions that came with having their designs chosen for this year's showcase. Their stories not only celebrate creativity, but also offer a glimpse into the passion and perseverance driving the next generation of designers.

DISCOVER FASS: To begin, how would you describe your overall collaborative experience while working on this garment design?

MR NURHANAFI: It is quite easy for us to work together as we already know each other, and have collaborated on a few projects prior to this one. We also share similar design directions and preferences, which helps a lot in terms of aligning our visions together.

DISCOVER FASS: Can you walk us through your creative process, especially your choices of patterns, colours, and the overall visual direction?

MS KOTCHAWAN: So, we started with the design brief, which included a batik-style concept and certain color schemes. From there, we played around with the motifs, making tweaks where needed, and went back and forth on colors to make sure the UBD's Ruby really stood out against the beige background. The most important part was exchanging feedback with each other and with our lecturers so we could make sure the designs actually fit the brief.

DISCOVER FASS: What inspired this design, and what personal meaning does it hold for you?

MR NURHANAFI: The inspiration behind this design comes from batik prints combined with UBD's motifs, which we adapted by modifying the colors and arrangements to give it a fresh, modern twist. We wanted to celebrate UBD's 40th anniversary in a way that reflects the university's legacy while presenting it in a contemporary style.

DISCOVER FASS: Every creative project has its obstacles. What were the main challenges you faced during the development of this garment?

MS KOTCHAWAN: We faced a few challenges right away. Since we usually work with traditional painting and digital illustration, getting used to professional graphic design software was a big challenge. It also took a lot of work to make sure all the motifs lined up correctly. The third major task was making sure the colors had the pop and vibrancy we wanted without losing the essential formal look for the anniversary.

If you had to capture the essence of your design in just three words, what would they be?

"Simple, neat, and delicate," Mr Nurhanafi

DISCOVER FASS: Who guided or mentored you throughout the process, and in what ways did their support influence your final outcome?

MR NURHANAFI: I would like to give a special thanks to Pg Dr Mohd Rahiman Pg Aliudin, who trusted us to handle this project. He was the one who motivated us to keep giving our very best throughout, and his support really influenced the final outcome by giving us the confidence to push our ideas further and stay committed

DISCOVER FASS: When you found out that your design was selected for the university showcase, what was your first reaction? How did you feel at that moment?

MS KOTCHAWAN: My first reaction was just, 'wow,' and honestly a bit of disbelief. For me, knowing that our design got selected and would be showcased in such a big anniversary celebration was kind of intimidating, but also really exciting. It was a truly humbling moment.

DISCOVER FASS: Finally, did you enjoy the entire process from concept to completion? What part of it did you find most rewarding?

MR NURHANAFI: I did enjoy the process because clothing design was completely new to me and a bit unexpected. Overall, it was a great chance to try something different and grow my creative skills. Honestly, at first we weren't completely confident with our design, so seeing it get accepted and knowing people liked it was reason enough for me.

MS KOTCHAWAN: I really enjoyed the whole process. We struggled at times, but we powered through. For me, the most satisfying part was seeing our design become a real garment. It was so rewarding to see our vision come to life.

Their openness in reflecting on their journey not only enriches our understanding of the design process but also inspires the wider university community.

Future of Brunei's Filmmaking: FASS-Made Film *WUJUD* Sweeps International Awards

The year 2025 continues to mark a series of remarkable achievements by the academics and students of FASS. One standout milestone traces back to July 2024, when *WUJUD*, a documentary directed by Mr Syafi Halim, a young and promising filmmaker from the Design and Creative Industries programme earned significant acclaim at the South East Academy International Film Festival (SEAiff). The film secured four major accolades: Best Documentary, Best Cinematography, Best Director, and Best Producer.

In November 2025, *WUJUD* achieved yet another milestone, bringing home the top honour at the 7th ASEAN International Film Festival & Awards (AIFFA 2025) Borneo Documentary Awards. The documentary won the Best Borneo Feature Documentary Award, presented at the Borneo Cultures Museum in Kuching, Sarawak.

Produced under New Wave Films, a company co-owned by Mr Syafi Halim, the documentary offers an intimate exploration of Bruneian identity and society through the interwoven lenses of culture, faith, and monarchy. It captures the intricacies of these relationships and presents rare personal narratives from a conservative and private community in the Sultanate. *WUJUD* also delves into Brunei's history and lived experiences, offering an authentic portrayal of the nation's cultural and historical landscape.

With multiple international accolades to its name, *WUJUD* not only celebrates the talent of its creators but also signals the rising visibility and recognition of Brunei's emerging film industry on the global stage.

As part of this feature, we sat down with Mr Syafi to learn more about his creative journey, the stories behind *WUJUD*, and his vision for the future of Bruneian filmmaking. What follows is an excerpt from our conversation with the filmmaker behind one of Brunei's most internationally recognised documentaries to date.

DISCOVER FASS: Firstly, congratulations on the international recognition *WUJUD* has received. When you first embarked on this project, did you anticipate it would resonate so strongly with audiences beyond Brunei?

MR SYAFI: Honestly, I don't think I even thought about it this far due to just the sheer length of the project's production. We started this project in March 2022 and it finally released in January 2025. There were moments where I felt that the film was never gonna be seen by the public. But I am just glad that all that hard work was paid off in the end.

DISCOVER FASS: *WUJUD* explores the intersection of culture, faith, and monarchy in shaping Bruneian identity. What inspired you to focus on these themes, and how did you approach presenting them with sensitivity and authenticity?

MR SYAFI: It was Dr Rui Oliveira Lopes' idea to cover those topics, he believed that in order to uncover what truly makes someone Bruneian, we need to embrace our differences. Not just in religion but in their interpretation of those concepts.

DISCOVER FASS: The documentary features personal stories from a community often described as conservative and private. How did you gain access, trust, and openness from your subjects throughout the filmmaking process?

MR SYAFI: I think that came with how we treated them before the interview, we were patient with them and also gave them a safe space to share, to feel and to be emotional. We had to cut out some parts for the final cut as some were too personal but we were also transparent with them throughout the editing process and letting them know which parts we were planning to include and vice versa.



DISCOVER FASS: Winning multiple awards, including Best Borneo Feature Documentary at AIFFA 2025, is a major milestone. What do these recognitions mean to you personally – and for Brunei's emerging film industry?

MR SYAFI: I think what's important is what it meant to the industry, for young filmmakers to see that it is possible for a Bruneian to compete with other ASEAN countries. Of course, I am not delusional, we are still far behind but it is not impossible.

DISCOVER FASS: As a young filmmaker and co-owner of New Wave Films, you are part of a new generation shaping local creative industries. How do you see the future of filmmaking in Brunei, and where do you hope to position your work within that landscape?

MR SYAFI: The main aim in the next 5 years is to create a sustainable career for other filmmakers in Brunei, not just directors but film crews as well. That comes with collaboration and kindness to one another, it's time for us to bring each other up rather than trying to pull each other down on the way up.

DISCOVER FASS: Every documentary comes with its own challenges. What were the most memorable difficulties you faced during the production of *WUJUD* – and how did you overcome them?

MR SYAFI: This was my first attempt in making a feature length documentary, especially coming from a YouTube and film background. It was quite a hefty task but Dr Lopes really put his confidence in me to make artistic choices and we collaborated well despite us having a lecturer-student relationship. Trying to fit 6 major concepts on what makes a Bruneian into a 90min documentary is also an impossible task but we can proudly say that we tried our best and hope future filmmakers will make better documentaries than this one as they explore the Bruneian identity.



DISCOVER FASS: Your film beautifully captures the nuances of Bruneian identity. What is one message or feeling you hope international audiences walk away with after watching *WUJUD*?

MR SYAFI: I would hope they walk away from the cinema, for them to think that Bruneians aren't just our labels of being rich, conservative or boring. But we exist as people, our stories and our lived experiences. It's easy to judge us from the news headlines or from the YouTube tourist videos. But when you properly sit and have a conversation with a Bruneian, you will realise that we are more than our labels, we are humans too.

DISCOVER FASS: Finally, with the success of *WUJUD*, audiences are eager to know what's next. Are there upcoming projects or stories you hope to explore in your future films?

MR SYAFI: I genuinely believe the success of *WUJUD* has yet to come, this film will be seen as a time capsule in 50 years time, a conversation with the past. Our next project will be released on 10th January next year where I will be co-directing with Joshua Belayan on Brunei's first National Geographic funded documentary, on the dying culture of making Gula Anau.

Discover FASS extends its heartfelt thanks to Mr Syafi for sharing his time, insights, and creative journey with us. His dedication and vision continue to inspire not only the filmmaking community, but all of us in FASS who believe in the power of storytelling.

FASS Alumni Awarded Chancellor's Scholarship to Pursue a Doctorate Degree in the UK

Ms Nurul Hazirah binti Haji Zainuddin holds MA by Research in Sociology and has been awarded with a highly prestigious Chancellor's Scholarship to undertake her PhD in the United Kingdom. Throughout her Masters study, she explored youth volunteerism in Brunei, where she explored notions of youth identity, active citizenship, and meaning-making in advocacy. She was fortunate to have a supportive Master's in Sociology by Research supervisor, Dr Meredian Alam from Department of Sociology and Anthropology, who served as her motivating mentor and guided her thoughtfully while also encouraging her independence as a researcher and an organisational leader.

Beyond academia, she kept herself busy volunteering with Kilang ReRoot and the Global Shapers Community BSB. Both organisations work toward important causes: promoting sustainable food production systems, and developing youth competencies to address unemployment in Brunei. Furthermore, her work experience covering Brunei's annual Legislative Council meetings has helped shape her understanding of key national priorities and the strategies being implemented to achieve them.



She also had the privilege of travelling to various ASEAN countries and beyond to learn from sustainability experts. One of her most memorable experiences was attending a conference in Milan in 2021, marking her first real exposure to the world of climate negotiations and policymaking. There, she learned directly from youth leaders, sustainability advocates, and global policymakers. It was an eye-opening experience that highlighted how young people can shape more just and adaptable policies.

Looking ahead, she will be pursuing her PhD in Human Geography at the University of Bristol, commencing in January 2026. Her doctorate research will be examining the role of youth and NGOs in environmental policymaking in Brunei. In many ways, this research unites the experiences and passions she has profoundly developed over the past few years. She is deeply grateful to have won the Chancellor's Scholarship, which allows me to pursue a topic close to her heart. As young people become more engaged in their communities, she truly believes that we must also recognise and make space for their voices, knowledge, and grassroots connections. Otherwise, we risk a new kind of brain drain – not of people, but of their ideas, creativity, and commitment.



Distinction Awarded: Excellence in Environmental Studies

Ms Syaza Azmi has recently graduated with a Master of Arts in Environmental Studies from the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, Universiti Brunei Darussalam. Her dissertation, "An Analysis of Belait Forest Cover Changes Pattern Using GIS and Remote Sensing," examined long-term environmental shifts in the Belait region through spatial data analysis and satellite imagery interpretation. Demonstrating strong analytical capacity and environmental research insight, her work received a Distinction at the 37th UBD Convocation in 2025. Syaza's research underscores the importance of scientific monitoring for sustainable forest management and contributes valuable understanding to conservation efforts in Brunei Darussalam.

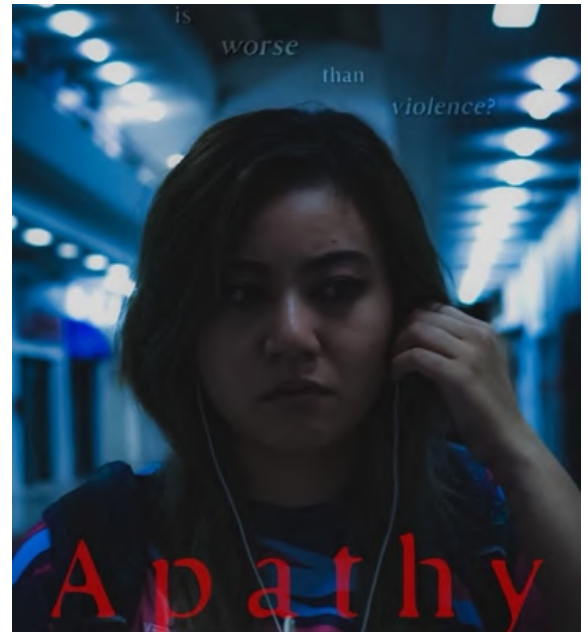

An academic visit by Mr Zulfadzlee Zulkiflee (PhD) and Ms Amieziezaitul Syazlien (MA) to Kampung Ampenan, Lombok, provided an engaging and insightful look into the linguistic and cultural landscapes of the Sasak and Malay communities in the region. The visit brought together observation, field engagement, and academic exchange, all of which enriched the students’ understanding of Nusantara heritage.

One of the primary activities involved a Focus Group Discussion (FGD) with residents from Melayu Timur, Melayu Tengah, and Melayu Bangsal. The session revealed the dynamic interplay between Sasak, Indonesian, and regional varieties of Malay. The group also visited Desa Sade, a traditional Sasak village known for its commitment to preserving ancestral customs. Students observed traditional weaving, learned about village architecture, and were introduced to the unique *kabwin culik* marriage tradition, an integral cultural practice conducted with mutual consent among families.

The trip concluded with participation in an academic event at Universitas Islam Negeri (UIN) Mataram, where scholars from UIN and UBD presented at the International Postgraduate Seminar, themed “Islam and the Actual Issues on Environment and Humanities.” The session strengthened academic ties and highlighted shared regional concerns.



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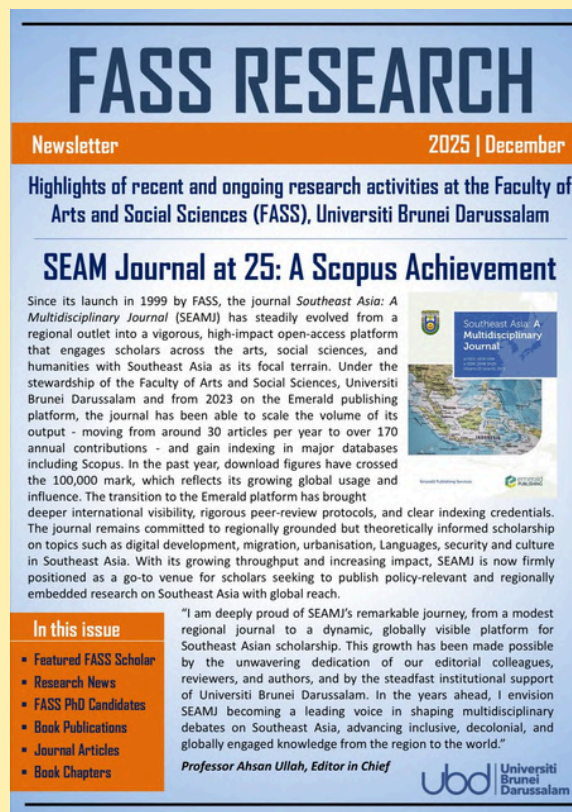
